

UAE poised to lead clean energy drive

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The UAE is receiving encouraging feedback on its pursuit to host the headquarters of the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA) in Abu Dhabi.

IRENA was officially established in Bonn, Germany, on January 26. More than 70 states have signed its statutes.

The agency seeks to become "the main driving force for promoting a rapid transition towards the widespread and sustainable use of renewable energy on a global scale," according to its charter.

Renewable energy is considered a key response to the energy challenges the world could face in future, in light of increasing global warming and climate change, and the constant rise in energy demand amid dwindling resources.

As a major energy player and a growing regional hub not only for business, but also for knowledge, the UAE is within its rights in wanting to host the agency's headquarters.
